Government & Politics


Government

 Institutions (Executive, Legislative, Judicial, Bureaucracy) that make policy for a society

Politics

- The process by which we select our government leaders and what policies these leaders produce
- Politics produces authoritative decisions about public issues
 - Who gets what, when and how?





5 Functions of all Governments


- Maintain a national defense
- Provide public services in the form of public goods (shared by all)
- Preserve Order
- Socialize the young (education)
- Collect taxes

The Policy Making Process

 The process by which policy comes into being and evolves over time

Public Policy

- A choice that government makes in response to a political issue
- Course of action taken with regard to some problem



Political Culture

- An overall set of values widely shared within a society
 - "...the United States is a country organized around an ideology which includes a set of dogmas about the nature of a good society."—Seymour M. Lipset
- Lipset breaks these dogmas into <u>5 elements</u>:
 - Liberty
 - Egalitarianism
 - Individualism
 - Laissez-Faire
 - Populism


Political Ideology

 A coherent set of beliefs about politics, public policy, and public purpose, which helps give meaning to political events

Polarization

Identity Politics: Pros & Cons




Identity Politics: politically organizing in the self-interest of a specific social group, such as ethnicity, race, sex, or sexual orientation


